In Debra Frasier's book *The Incredible Water Show*, the students from *Miss Alaineus: A Vocabulary Disaster* return to perform their Science Fair project on the neighborhood stage. Create your own Water Extravaganza based on this book, or expand the script by adding your own amazing facts about water. **Stage it QUICK! Or EASY! Or GRAND!** Turn the page to see how.

Stage it



Draw the entire performance, scene by scene.

Add comic book "text bubbles" so the drawn actors deliver the facts as lines in the play. For an example, see the enclosed reproducible copy of the hydrocycle page from The Incredible Water Show.

Research other water facts and add new scenes to the exhibition. Post the scene pictures in the hallway or frame each one in cardboard box "theaters" for the library. Write biographies of the actors. Make posters.

Stage it QUICK!

Copy the enclosed reproducible character puppet. (Add desired extras: Dinosaurs? A pirate ship?) Cut out. Color with markers. Mount on bamboo skewers. Have the paper characters perform on desktops, using books covered with plain paper to hide the puppeteers.





Make a cardboard box stage. (Cut one for all performers, or one for each scene.) Attach sticks to top of each puppet. Enter and exit through slits cut into the sides of the box "theater."

OR! Make NO puppets! Make NO stage! Use "found objects" for each character. A wooden kitchen spoon could be Forest! (Add a paper top hat?) A scrub brush could be the dog. (Add paper ears?) Do you have a watering can? See if it can become a dinosaur like the one pictured on the back of *The Incredible Water Show*!

Note: Advise puppeteers to keep their attention on their puppets because an audience will always follow the eyes of a visible puppeteer.

Stage it GRAND!

Follow the seven scenes as they appear in the book *The Incredible Water Show*. Visit debrafrasier.com for a scene-by-scene guide. On a stage, use plastic baby pools to catch water, like a three-ring circus. Introduce anything that can hold or carry water—pitchers, teakettles, plant misters, hydropacks.


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

Dinosaurs? Cut out cardboard animals or carry watering cans made to look like apatosaurus. Cast your dog and cat as costumed players. Need more characters for a larger cast? Consider doubling the Purple, Orange, and Green chorus members. Add water songs! Use the old vaudeville trick of secretly switching a water-filled bucket with confetti to throw on the audience in the finale!

Offer These Vocabulary Challenges





Water Words

gurgle plop drop cascade glisten sparkling shimmering waves

Brainstorm lists of waterrelated adjectives and verbs. Think visually. Think auditorially.

Water Songs

Use brainstorm words to replace the lyrics of wellknown songs with syllables from water words.

Try this to the tune of "Happy Birthday;" insert these syllables and sing:

"Bub-ble, bub-ble, plop, drop, Bub-ble, bub-ble, plop, drop..."

Add a soundtrack to your play, or film your scene picture and add songs.

Make Programs Find These Words

Write program notes and biographies using the book's model. Cast six students in the main parts and write about each of their interests and how they each helped make the show.

Interesting words and terms pepper the text of The Incredible Water Show.
Look for:

miraculous • hydrogen oxygen • atom H₂O • substance • water acrobatics • glistening precisely • sloshing perpetually • recycling . .
