
- Large cardboard sheets make it easier. Call a carton company or use appliance boxes or foam core. Cardboard paints best if painted white f rst.
- Use the white fabric for the ocean and span the width of the stage. Use the blue fabric for the ocean and span the width of the stage twice.

PERFORMANCE HINTS:

- Keep cardboard shapes small enough to handle easily
- Extend poles for sun and Moon so they can rest on the ground *on* make carrying pouch to tie around waist, pole slips into pocket
- Hot glue Velcro to attach child to Earth to add and remove easily
- Paint both sides of all cardboard props, use a white primer f rst
- Ask children to draw, invite parents to cut cardboard shapes
- For tree branches look for tree trimming scraps, add paper leaves with wire
- For Tree characters, build in "rest zones" with crossed arms, reducing strain
- Perhaps Migrating Animals reenter appropriate scenes: ocean, forest, sky, etc.
- Perhaps narrator delivers all lines, or maybe some lines are spoken by characters
- Look through the glossary in On the Day You Were Born. Select facts that are interesting, for placards. Perhaps an imp-like character runs through with signs, turning from question to answer, or question is chased by an answer?
- · All performers could dress in black, white, or jeans
- Wooden paint stirrers make great supports for small puppets. Hot glue to cardboard
- Remember that many of the props can be hand-held with no stick support
- Very important: When a prop is being moved, the puppeteer needs to keep their eyes *on the Prop* because the audience eyes will follow the attention of the puppeteer. If the puppeteer's eyes drift, audience attention will follow directly.

MUSIC NOTES:


- Instruments can be traditional OR be created from things found in the natural world. Consider rocks, sticks, dried leaves on a branch, pebbles, bamboo, shells, even feathers. Metal junk can also serve: metal drums, cans, sheet aluminum (great thunder), or create a "junk tree" of hanging metal parts to play as a percussion instrument.
- Let the narration and the music "talk" to each other.




1. Narrator: On the eve of your birth...
(Actors enter carrying each animal—add as many to each species as needed)








4. While you waited in darkness... (Turn Earth...add lots of stars)




S. ...spinning the night into light. (Turn Earth on edge...Hold out Sun's ribbon rays)





3. (SUN DANCE!)




...the qulet Moon glowed...

(Walk Earth around on edge, keep star in place)




...the Moon pulled on the ocean below and ... (Gently wave blue cloth. Shake white cloth.)




/2- ...while far out at sea, clouds swelled... (Shake cloth with increasing wildness! Storm!)




13. (Storm clears. One end of cloth drops, slowly pulled. Music/sounds slow. One tree branch edges out in wind.)






(Trees sway branches. Child is carried through forest. Reindeer peeks?)





(Leaves arch. Child figures turn slowly.)








...the Moon pulled... (Shiny, glittering music!)




20 ...And then, with a push, you slipped out... (Tumbling children, slow motion.)




21- Welcome to our spinning world...
